Senior Citizens

From 8 years of age dogs and cats are in their senior years (the equivalent of a human in their late 50s) and this is often the time when age related health problems start to show themselves.

Because of this, our older pets need a bit of extra care to keep them happy and healthy for as long as possible.

Problems that we see commonly in our senior pets:

- Lumps and bumps
- More severe dental disease
- Arthritis
- Dementia
- Organ failure (including heart, kidney, liver)
- Eye problems

What you can do to help:

- Bring your senior pet in **twice a year** for a check up.
- We recommend a **blood test and urine test** at least once a year to monitor major organ function for signs of disease.
- These check ups will help provide **peace of mind** for you and will allow us to get onto any problems early and begin treatment if necessary.
- We'll get you to fill out a form about your pet's behaviour at home which will help us assess if dementia may be starting to be a problem
- Always tell us if something has changed since the last visit even if you're not sure it's important.

Older pets can have other **non-medical problems**: they may not be so good at grooming themselves and may have occasional toileting accidents, so extra grooming and bedding care can make them much more comfortable too.

Horse dental essentials!

Horses are cool!

More specifically their teeth are cool - they have **12 incisors** at the front for cutting grass off and **12 premolars and 12 molars** all for chewing!

Horses are designed to be **constantly grazing** which means their teeth are being **constantly worn** down. To allow for this, their **teeth continually grow!** With so much activity in



the mouth, issues can develop depending on how the teeth are wearing - we can see **problems** including sharp edges, uneven wearing and plaque buildup. These can cause **pain**, **problems eating and weight loss**, **problem behaviours when ridden** with a bit and **health issues**.

To help keep our horses in tip-top condition they need regular dental checkups (just like us!)

Up to the age of 5 years

- Horses are growing adult teeth and losing baby teeth, with 40 teeth erupting over this period!
- Because of these rapid changes, a dental exam should be performed every 6 months during this time to pick up any problems early
- Examination prior to a young horse being started can help prevent pain and problems associated with wearing a bit.

• 6 years - 15 years

- dental exam should be performed every 12 months
- performance horses should have a dental exam every 6 months

• Over 15 years (senior horses)

- tooth eruption slows down and we see much shorter teeth and sometimes these teeth are lost altogether. These horses may need soft food and additional supportive care.
- dental exam should be performed every 6 months
- early detection of problems can extend the working life of our horses

Dr Lorna has completed an intensive veterinary equine dental course and is our go-to for equine dentistry. Our **dental examinations include**:

- physical examination and health check
- sedation
- complete visual and physical dental exam
- correction of issues with power and hand tools
- written report of all findings
- recommendations for any further treatment
- referral to specialist equine dentists if needed
- reminders set up so you won't forget checkups!
